On behalf of VASSAR President Kent Webber and the George Washington Chapter, I am pleased to invite you to attend the 2013 VASSAR Semi-Annual Meeting in Old Town Alexandria, September 13-14, 2013. You will also find information regarding two of President Webber's initiatives — support for the Knight Essay Contest and the November 2, 2013 grave marking of Bermuda-born patriot St. George Tucker (and the associated multi-year program).

The Saturday Ladies Program, arranged by President Webber, will be a tour of Historic Carlyle House. The house was completed in 1753 by British merchant John Carlyle for his bride, Sarah Fairfax of Belvoir. Their home quickly became a center of social and political life in Alexandria and gained a foothold in history when British General Braddock made the mansion his headquarters in 1755. Braddock summoned five colonial governors to meet there to plan the early campaigns of the French and Indian War. One of our honored guests at the luncheon will be Caitlin Collins, National President of the Children of the American Revolution. The registration packet includes information on her national project: Student Veterans of America. DINING SUGGESTIONS IN OLD TOWN ALEXANDRIA

Old Town Alexandria has some fantastic restaurants within a short walk of the Hotel Monaco. There is no way to describe them all on a single sheet of paper, but here are some suggestions. Bon Appetit!

Jackson 20 (703-842-2790) is adjacent to the Hotel Monaco. This local favorite features modern American tavern fare, craft beers and cocktails and a wine list with bottles priced at a palate-pleasing and wallet-satisfying \$20.

Gadsby's Tavern, 138 North Royal Street (703-548-1288). The ultimate SAR experience -- fine dining since the 1770s. Jefferson had his second "inaugural ball" at the tavern in 1805, and Gorge Washington, John Adams, James Madison & James Monroe were regulars. They probably missed out on the outstanding (if expensive) crab cakes.

Columbia Firehouse, 109 South Saint Asaph Street (703-683-1776). This is "cool remake of an old firehouse" that describes itself as a modern American brasserie and offers a moderately" priced American menu alight with "interesting twists." Specialties include onion rings, oysters, lobster salad, and steamed mussels.

Il Porto Ristorante, 121 King Street (703-836-8833). You guessed it -- Italian! An Old Town institution since 1973, its midpriced menu remains a favorite of fans who swear by its sauces, both "light and complex" and so "rich" and "meaty" they taste as if they'd "been cooking for hours." The plaster-and-beam construction lends it an "old-world charm."

The Wharf, 119 King Street (703-836-2836). History has been written inside the walls of the Wharf, with its 1790's style architecture featuring original wood columns and beams that are charred black from a Civil War fire. Since 1971, satisfied diners have been heading to The Wharf for whole Maine lobster, local soft shell crabs and prime steaks and chops. The restaurant has recently been renovated and remodeled and the menu updated to include many contemporary seafood items along with their traditional Chesapeake Bay creations.

Union Street Public House, 121 South Union Street (703-548-1785). Located in a renovated colonial waterfront warehouse, Union Street has been serving locals and visitors with fresh seafood, grilled steaks and chops in a warm convivial atmosphere since 1986 and has earned its reputation as "Old Town's Favorite Tap & Grill."

Fontaine Caffe and Creperie, 119 South Royal Street (703-535-8151). A causal European style restaurant serving Steak Frites, Mussels, Pates, Cheese, Vegetarian dishes, authentic savory and sweet French crêpes and Cidres. The restaurant also has an excellent craft beer and boutique wine selection.

Chipolte Mexican Grill, 601 King Street. For the compatriot with only a little time between meetings.

Subway at 320 King Street. For the cost-conscious compatriot - they bake their bread daily!



2013-14 VASSAR Presidential Initiative Support of the George S. & Stella M. Knight Essay Contest

The SAR's youth essay contest is named for a former Virginia Society president and first lady who contributed the money that today forms the core of the SAR's essay endowment fund. George S. and Stella M. Knight were committed to advancing the SAR's mission among the youth of America, and their vision has enabled the SAR to support the college dreams of many students over the past two decades. The Virginia Society has sponsored the winning essay in the national contest four times during that period, including the last three years in a row, and thus our efforts have enabled Virginia high school students to bring significant prize money home to Virginia.

But due to the extended period of low interest rates that we have all experienced during the past five years, the endowment has not been able to produce a sufficient amount of income to support the national-level scholarships that have been given in the past. Accordingly, the SAR has adopted a medal to recognize financial support for the SAR's essay endowment fund. The medal is named for Thomas Jefferson, author of the Declaration of Independence, governor of Virginia, and 3rd President of the United States.

The connections between the Knight Essay Contest and Virginia are significant and long standing. Accordingly, it is appropriate to encourage support for the Knight Essay Contest through a



2013-14 VASSAR Presidential Initiative. Each chapter that makes a contribution of at least \$250 to the SAR essay endowment fund between July 4, 2013, and December 31, 2013, will be recognized with a streamer at the 2014 VASSAR Annual Meeting. The three Virginia chapters that contribute the most to the fund between those dates will receive special recognition at the VASSAR Annual Meeting.

Contributions made by a chapter or by individuals will be credited to the chapter for purposes of this initiative. Individuals making a contribution of \$250 or more will receive the Jefferson Medal. For each \$250 contributed by a chapter (and not by a particular individual), the chapter will be entitled to present a Jefferson Medal to a person of its choosing. The recipient need not be a member of the SAR. The Jefferson

Medal is a particularly appropriate way to recognize a teacher or principal who has promoted the contest for many years or a chapter essay contest chairman who has served for several years. Medals will be presented at both the Semi Annual Meeting in September and the Annual Meeting in February.

The Bermuda Gunpowder Plot

August 14, 1775

The SAR, DAR and C.A.R. have joined forces to bring attention to Bermuda's role in the American Revolution with a limited-edition commemorative pin and a series of events over a three-year period. Bermuda is a British territory located 640 miles off Cape Hatteras. It was settled in 1609 when a storm drove the Jamestown-bound *Sea Venture* onto the reefs around its 181 islands.

The Bermuda Gunpowder Plot pin commemorates a little-known event in the struggle for independence and honors the service of Bermuda-born Patriots Thomas Tudor Tucker of South Carolina and St. George Tucker of Virginia. The Tuckers were younger sons of Henry Tucker Sr., a prominent Bermuda trader and a member of the Governor's Council. As tensions between the colonies and Great Britain increased, the brothers separately advised American leaders that desperately needed gunpowder could be found in the unguarded magazine at St. George's, Bermuda. Meanwhile, their father traveled to Philadelphia to negotiate with Benjamin Franklin for an exemption from the trade embargo imposed on loyalist colonies by the Continental Congress. Franklin suggested that such an exemption could be arranged – in exchange for the gunpowder.

On the night of August 14, 1775, a group of Bermudians, led by Henry Tucker Sr., "borrowed" about 100 barrels from the magazine and rolled them down a hill toward Tobacco Bay. There small boats took the barrels to two waiting American schooners – the *Lady Catherine* and the *Packet*. St. George Tucker was in the town of St. George at the time, but as a known rebel he spent the night strolling with Bermuda's chief justice to establish an alibi. The *Lady Catherine* brought its precious cargo of gunpowder to Philadelphia while the *Packet* went to Charleston. Some of the *Packet*'s gunpowder was used in the defense of Sullivan's Island by patriot forces (led by Colonel William Moultrie) on June 28, 1776. The successful defense of Sullivan's Island prevented the British from occupying Charleston for nearly four years until 1780.

Pin sale proceeds will establish a fund for the **Children of the American Revolution** to prepare for the 250th Anniversary of the Revolutionary Era (2023-2031) and support Bermuda charities selected by the Somers Isles Chapter of the **Daughters of the American Revolution** – partial compensation for the gunpowder stolen nearly 240 years ago.

What is SVA?

Mission

To provide military veterans with the resources, support, and advocacy needed to succeed in higher education and following graduation.

Vision

All veterans will succeed in higher education, achieve their academic goals, and gain meaningful employment.

About SVA

Today's veterans face numerous obstacles in their path of attaining a college degree. These challenges range from a missing sense of camaraderie to feeling like an outsider amongst 18 year old traditional students to a lack of understanding by university faculty. When coupled with the visible and invisible wounds of war, a college degree can be an elusive goal for men and women returning from military service. Student Veterans of America (SVA) makes that goal a reality.

SVA is a 501(c)(3) coalition of student veterans groups on college campuses across the globe. These member chapters are the "boots on the ground" that help veterans reintegrate into campus life and succeed academically. Each chapter must be an officially recognized student group by their university or college and provide a peer-to-peer network for veterans who are attending the school. Additionally, chapters often coordinate campus activities, provide pre-professional networking, and generally provide a touchstone for student veterans in higher education.

LOCAL AND STATE SOCIETY PARTICIPATION

Local and State societies can participate in the following ways:

- Visit and Support Local SVA Chapters.
 - SVA Chapters are located at colleges and universities around the country. There may very well be a SVA chapter at a nearby college or university where each chapter may visit. If there is none close, societies may choose to support a SVA chapter from anywhere around the country.
 - Support to SVA chapters may include monetary donations as well as donations of items that may be needed in a college environment (school supplies, clothing, etc.). Younger members may also want to write notes and color pictures to send to these chapters and members. Although these heroes are not overseas currently, a picture/letter to thank them for their service is always a great thing for them to cherish.
